A Great and Joyful Challenge!

God's people coming alongside parents who desire a Christian education for their kids.

Lord knows there are many changes happening these days. Some of them are not good at all (we each have our own list), but some are good ... even very good. One of those very good changes is the increasing number of parents who are now expressing a desire for a Christian education for their children. We see this locally, both in the growing enrollment in our own Christian Day School (projecting an increase of at least ten students next year) and in the number of our graduating 8th graders who are electing to continue their education at one of the two Lutheran High Schools in our area --- Minnesota Valley Lutheran H.S. in New Ulm and Mayer Lutheran High School. In fact, all 5 of this year's ILS graduates are hoping to attend one of these schools. Together with ILS graduates of previous years, this will make 11 who will be attending a Lutheran High School next year.

As you're no doubt aware, this requires a significant investment of time, energy and dollars on the part of these families. To address the financial challenge, Immanuel has for many years operated a Tuition Assistance Program (TAP). This has made attending our school an affordable choice for all families regardless of their financial status. And, due to the generosity of many in our school and church community, we have always been able to meet this need; distributing between \$10,000 and \$15,000 annually. This help, however, has been restricted to elementary grades.

Recently, the Immanuel Board of Education and Church Council approved an extension of our TAP program to include the first two years at a Lutheran High School. This extension will allow families to apply for a maximum \$2000 subsidy for the first year and a maximum of a \$1000 subsidy for the second year. This expansion was made possible largely by the very generous participants of our annual spring fundraiser. In fact, sufficient funds are already on hand to fund this "joyful obligation" for the next two vears. Praise God!

The Barnabus Group



Given the actual cost of tuition, however, the financial reality is that most families will need additional help beyond their own resources and our ILS Tuition Assistance Program. For that reason, other anonymous individuals from our congregation and community who recognize the great need to ground our children in a Christian view of the world, and who recognize how richly God has blessed them (so that they can be a blessing to others) have banned together to form a "Barnabus Group" ... an organization dedicated to helping meet this additional need.

With the growing number of families in need of our help, we are hoping that more individuals will consider joining us. As you celebrate Easter this year imagine yourself walking along with the three women -Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome, as they went to anoint the body of Jesus. Do you feel like them? As you approach the burial cave early Sunday morning with Salome and the two Mary's, are you asking with them: "Who will roll the stone away from the entrance of the tomb?

The big stone was far too heavy for the women to move - this stone which represented the finality of death and the heavy questions which faced Jesus' followers. What would happen now? Would the soldiers arrest them also? Would they end up on a cross themselves? Where should they go? What should they do? Every question was filled with hopelessness. We live in hopeless situations. We face death, sickness and despair each day. We have more than one stone to roll away, and so we ask: "Who will roll the stone away?" What can you say to a mother who has lost one of her children? What can you say to a man who has lost his job and cannot provide food for his hungry family? We cry out with the Mary's and Salome, "Who will roll the stone away?

It is God who rolls every one of our stones away. It is God who gives us the beautiful truth that new life and hope await us in Christ our Risen Savior. This is our hope. It is because of Easter that we declare to the world that our only hope is in the Resurrection of our Lord. We absolutely refuse to succumb to hopelessness but will only look to our sure hope in the Living Lord. Just when we think everything is hopeless, it is exactly there that God is doing God's work most powerfully. When the two Mary's and Salome came to the tomb they were shocked and broken because they expected to see a closed tomb. And even if some people came to help roll the big stone away, they expected to see Jesus' dead body. But no! What they saw was the result of God's power, working in a totally unexpected way! Even with all the stones in place - even when we are feeling hopeless, it is God's hand and God's plan that are working for us.

Today our Risen Christ is able to work in you to change hatred into love, animosity into neighborliness, bitterness into trust. How can this happen? It happens when we confess our hatred and bitterness to God, when we confess that we cannot roll the stone away by ourselves. It is exactly then that God is working in us, working to roll the heavy stone away and to replace it with the joy of Easter, with the love of God.

INDEED!
