


# The EXPRESSION-December 2023

I like the darkness, the quietness, and the reflective nature of Advent. I enjoy the progression of candle lighting on the Advent wreath. I love the hymns - "O Lord, How Shall I Meet You" and "Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus" and "On Jordon's Banks the Baptist's Cry". I am fed by the themes of hope and preparation.

I happen to think that truly observing Advent is the perfect antidote to the devastation of Christmas. While I am particularly fond of Advent I am equally appalled at what has happened to Christmas. This religious holiday - that in the church begins on December 24 and ends on January 5 - has become a cultural event that is far removed from what it is intended to be. Christmas is now a time for vacations, for parties, for spending when its reason for existing is to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ in worship. Why do people who do not believe in Jesus celebrate Christmas? Afterall, those of us who are not Muslims do not celebrate Ramadan and those of us who are not of the Jewish faith do not celebrate Hanukah.

Pick up any newspaper, the articles in the business section focus on whether or not the economy will be saved by Christmas, since many retailers make 50 percent of their profits at this time. This year there were Christmas advertisements on TV before Halloween acknowledging that it was early to mention Christmas shopping, but that people should get a head start on their spending. I literally shouted out loud, "Stop the madness", when I came out a local grocery store before Halloween to voices singing, "Hark The Herald Angels Sing."

Do I feel strongly about this? Yes, I do. It's up to Christians to reclaim our religious holiday. It's up to the church to set an example by slowing down, by observing the beauty of Advent that builds and builds until we arrive at Christmas Eve and the great celebration of our Lord's birth that continues for 12 more days. Shouldn't the church be overflowing on December 31? That's the first Sunday of Christmas and should be one of the most celebrative days of the year.

Focusing on spiritual matters during Advent is the gift we have to give to the world, along with the greatest gift, the Bethlehem babe, Jesus our Lord.

May you each be blessed during this time of preparing for his arrival.
